





In the first in our series of events marking the 75th anniversary of George Orwell's 1984, we ask two experts in their field to imagine what our country's economic landscape could look like in 35 years' time.

Author, columnist at The Guardian and environmental campaigner George Monbiot, and economist and philosopher Daniel Chandler, come together to reimagine a future society inspired by questions posed in their latest books like: 'is there an alternative to neoliberalism?' and 'what would a fair society look like?'

In Monbiot's latest book *The Invisible Doctrine*, he examines neoliberalist policy, how it drives inequality and harms our mental wellbeing and the environment.

Chandler's book Free and Equal: What would a fair society look like? builds a case for fundamentally re-designing our basic institutions, giving everyone a fair share – not just of income and wealth – but of power, dignity and self-respect.



Flirtatious, witty and antagonistic, Woolf and Bell were intellectual equals sparring over the nature of both love and art. Their letters – astute, fierce and very funny – will be brought to life by biographer Mark Hussey and celebrated British actor Toby Jones, recent star of ITV's Mr Bates vs The Post Office.

Caroline Lucas has led the Green Party and has been MP for Brighton Pavilion since 2010. In her new book *Another England*, she challenges the idea of 'Englishness' as a byword for imperial nostalgia and seeks to reclaim it.

Together with musician and activist Billy Bragg, a self-styled 'progressive patriot' and a national institution in protest songs, they will be sketching out an alternative version of English identity that progressives can embrace.

Zeinab Badawi, award-winning TV presenter and documentarian, will discuss her book *An African History of Africa* which seeks to redress this imbalance. She is joined by Nigerian novelist Ayòbámi Adébáyó, whose first two prize-nominated novels have been praised for shining a light on Nigerian life, and Dipo Faloyin, senior editor at VICE and author of *Africa is not a Country*.
